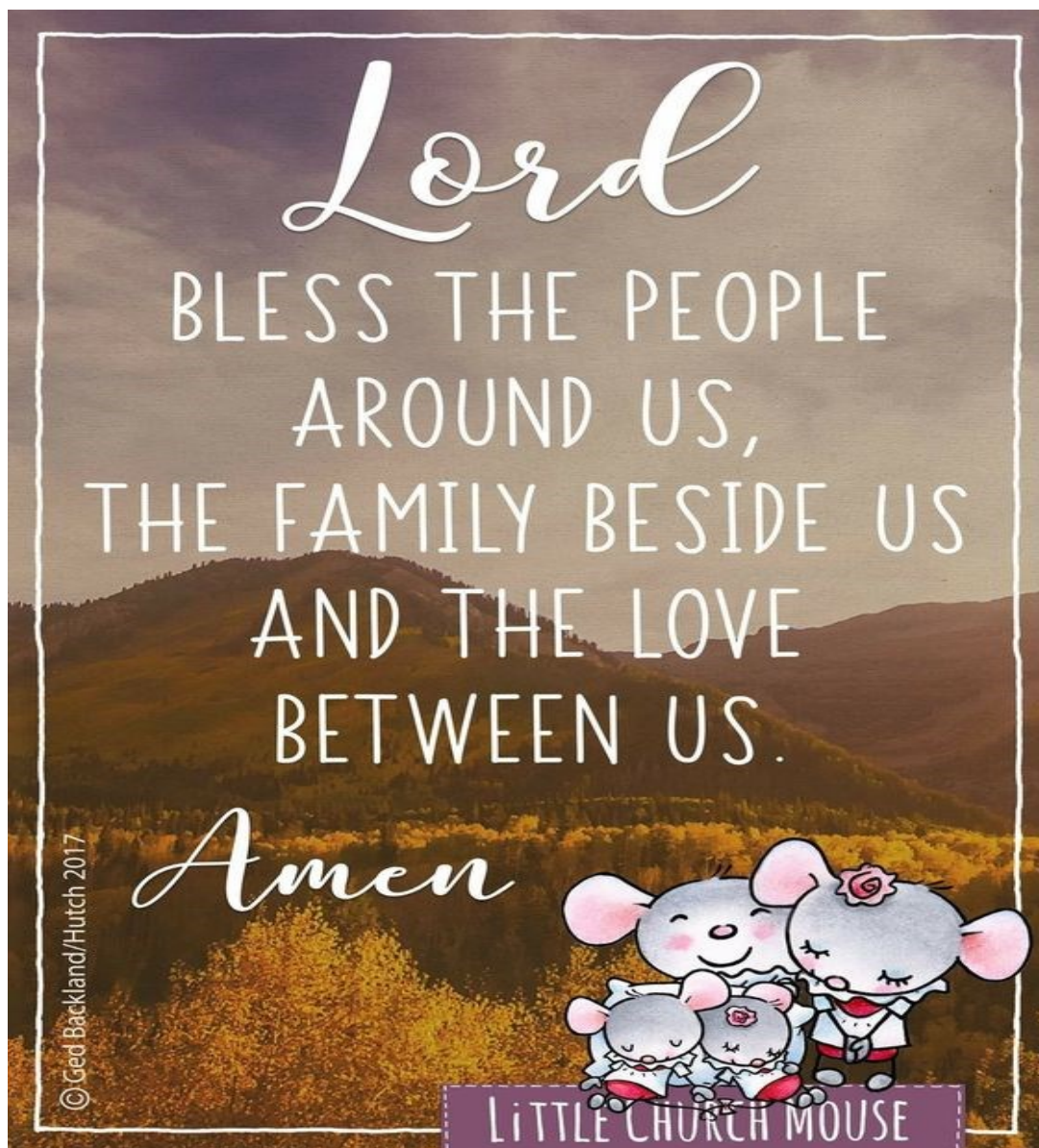

Greetings!

"Hosanna! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord!" (Psalm 118:26a NRSV)

The crowds shouted "Hosanna" as Jesus the Christ, the Messiah, rode into Jerusalem on a donkey just as a king would returning home in triumph. The people laid down their garments and branches from the trees to pave his way in honor and reverence. There was great joy for them as they shouted in the hopes that Jesus was the one who would save them from the oppressive hands of their enemies. They were happy seeking more happiness in a future of freedom and peace. A great burden would be lifted.

We go from the joy of Palm Sunday to a very somber and emotional evening that pours into a day of horror for the people who truly love Jesus. Some have faced the mirror of shame that has exposed the fears leading them to run and deny knowing Jesus instead of standing with him. Others, like Mary (his mother), were there at the cross. Mary, who heard his cries of birth, also heard his cries of death. Such a weight she must have carried on her heart.

But what a weight was lifted and what joy there was for a thief: a thief who came to the defense of Jesus on the cross even as he hung awaiting death himself. Acknowledging the weight of his sin as something he deserved and asking Jesus for nothing but to be remembered when Jesus entered HIS OWN kingdom was the best thing he could have ever done at that moment. In that statement, Jesus heard the thief express deep regret and accountability for his sins, and that he BELIEVED Jesus to be king! He believed in Jesus!! What joy was had when they died together on the cross only to find life in paradise!

But the weight still needed to be lifted for the followers of Christ who were still in hiding and felt they were dying on their own "crosses" as they mourned the loss of their Lord and their courage in the face of evil and sin.

And then Sunday came...and the weight WAS lifted! Like the great, heavy rock that block the tomb where Jesus was laid, their pain and burdens were removed, cast aside! Christ had risen as he said he would - - the temple that was torn down WAS raised again in three days. And Jesus WANTED to see the disciples! Getting that message from Mary Magdalene that he even wanted to see them after they ran and left him to fend for himself not only brought them the joy that he LIVED, but also the forgiveness that they sought for hurting him. A huge weight was gone; but now, they must joyfully accept the yoke of faithful service to God.



Through Jesus Christ, God lifts those heavy burdens of sin and death from us; but we need to remember that God's grace is still at work sanctifying us and all that we do in God's name. Once forgiven, we are changed, reborn and we need to remember that we are not perfect, but must work toward perfection in love with study, fellowship, service, and worship. We are Easter people who need to take on the yoke of discipleship with the faith that the Holy Spirit empowers and guides us. In that faith, the yoke is never heavy, yet we are reminded that it is there and that we have much to do for Christ's kingdom on earth.

Happy and Blessed Easter everyone!!

Do you know... ...where the idea of the Easter Bunny came from?

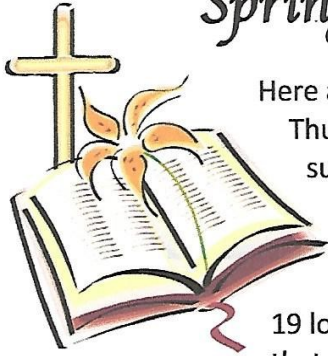

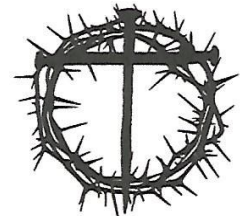

A Letter of Support to Churches from Eastern PA Conference Leadership



March 31, 2020

"Therefore encourage one another and build up one another, just as you also are doing." (1 Thessalonians 5:11)

Dear Sisters and Brothers and Christ,

The Eastern PA Conference leadership recognizes we are in unprecedented times. We give thanks for the ways that our churches have continued to worship in new forms over these past weeks. We know this has not been easy, and we recognize the amount of time and learning that has gone into transforming worship using conference calls, videoconferencing, livestreaming and other online platforms.

In addition, we give thanks for the sacrificial generosity of our churches over these weeks. Many churches have created online giving solutions for their members. For some of our churches, preschools have been suspended and offices closed, placing churches in the difficult position of furloughing staff. Please know that Bishop Peggy Johnson, the Extended Cabinet and Conference Staff are aware of many of the challenges that our churches are facing, although we confess that we may be unaware of particularly critical situations in some places.

Let us stay connected

Please help us keep open the lines of communication so we can go through this crisis together with you. The Bishop, Cabinet and Conference staff are here to work with churches during this time. And we give thanks for our United Methodist connectional system that enables us to quickly resource one another. We recommend the following:

- Please continue to check our Eastern PA Conference's website (especially our Coronavirus Ministry Response page), our NEWSpirit Digest newsletter and social media for information and resources on live-streaming, Zoom videoconferencing and online giving.
- Should financial challenges arise in your contexts as a result of the pandemic, please contact your District Superintendent directly to set a plan with your leadership regarding ways to proceed. Respectfully and with compassion, leadership within the Eastern PA Conference will be working on a case by case basis with churches.
- Over the past twelve years, Eastern PA has worked tirelessly on the Pre-1982 clergy pension liability. Due to churches' and individuals' faithfulness, we were on track to becoming 100% funded prior to the pandemic. The bulk of our Conference financial reserves have been directed to this goal. While we will work closely with churches that are facing difficult financial realities due to the pandemic, our resources are limited. Therefore, we implore all churches to strive to fully fund all their conference obligations.
- The Conference and Cabinet continue to seek other measures that might be implemented to assist churches. We are analyzing the provisions of the newly passed federal CARES Act. We are waiting for guidelines on how to apply for the Small Business Administration (SBA) forgivable loans program under the act. Our churches are eligible

to participate in this program to provide support for payroll, utility and debt payment relief. Until the guidelines are published, we suggest the following:

- Contact your bank to determine if they are a partner with SBA, and advise them of your intent to apply.
- Finalize your 2019 Financial Reports and 1st quarter 2020 financials.
- Arrange a virtual meeting of your church's Charge Conference to authorize receiving a loan. (This has been approved by Bishop Peggy Johnson.)
- Churches can have a preliminary vote with their leadership team to get approval to begin the process for the CARES ACT funding, and then follow-up with an official Charge Conference (in order to follow the 10-day guideline for charge conferences). We want our churches to be first in line for funding so please do not delay on your application.

Keep your District Superintendent informed

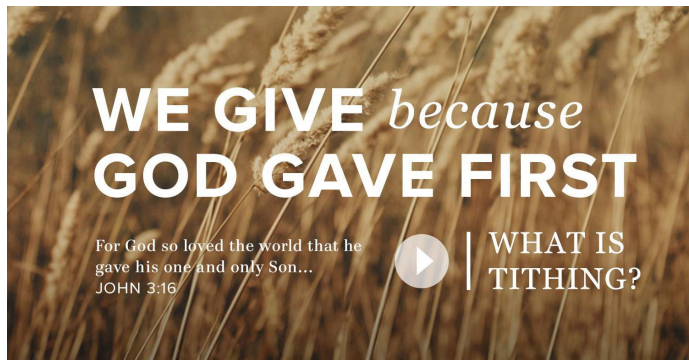
- Keep your District Superintendent informed of any especially challenging circumstances your church may be experiencing.
- Review the InJoy Stewardship (www.injoystewardship.com/cares-act) information as a resource related to this opportunity. InJoy Stewardship Resources has done an excellent job summarizing the way the federal CARES act can help churches during this very difficult time. Be sure to watch the video webinar.
- Important points to catch from this webinar:
 - Churches do qualify for the Payroll Protection Loan program.
 - You can receive 2.5 times your monthly payroll expenses (including pensions and health care).
 - Your loan may be forgiven completely if you use it as the program prescribes (salaries, etc.) for the 8 weeks following the disbursement and if you do not reduce staff or salaries during that time.
 - You should receive your funds promptly.

We do not know how long we will be in this current situation. We know there are many households that are continuing to honor their financial commitments, for which we give thanks to God. We do know that in our local churches, by the grace of God (Romans 12:8), some households are able to meet their entire financial commitment, or give more for the year 2020 immediately...or, at least, to “pay ahead” on their full-year gifts right now.

Similarly, we anticipate that some of our stronger congregations, with abundant resources in reserve, could choose to double-up on their giving today in order to help cover for those churches that will need a delay.

More importantly, we do know that God walks with us through our valleys and God provides manna for each day. We give thanks for the resiliency we see in our churches, and we pray for God's continued blessings upon you, your families and your ministries. Please know that key Conference leaders are meeting weekly and will continue to provide updates as we have new information.

The easiest way to do this is to go to our website LUMC-ONLINE.ORG and signup for online giving. The link is in the center that says GIVE NOW. You can choose how you would like your offering distributed as

General, Capital Improvement, Faith Promise, Reserve Giving or Other.

You can choose the frequency and if you would like it to come from a checking, savings or credit card. Then just enter your donation information. In closing this message to you remember 3 John 2: "I pray that you may enjoy good health and that all may go well with you, even as your soul is getting along well". God bless all of you.

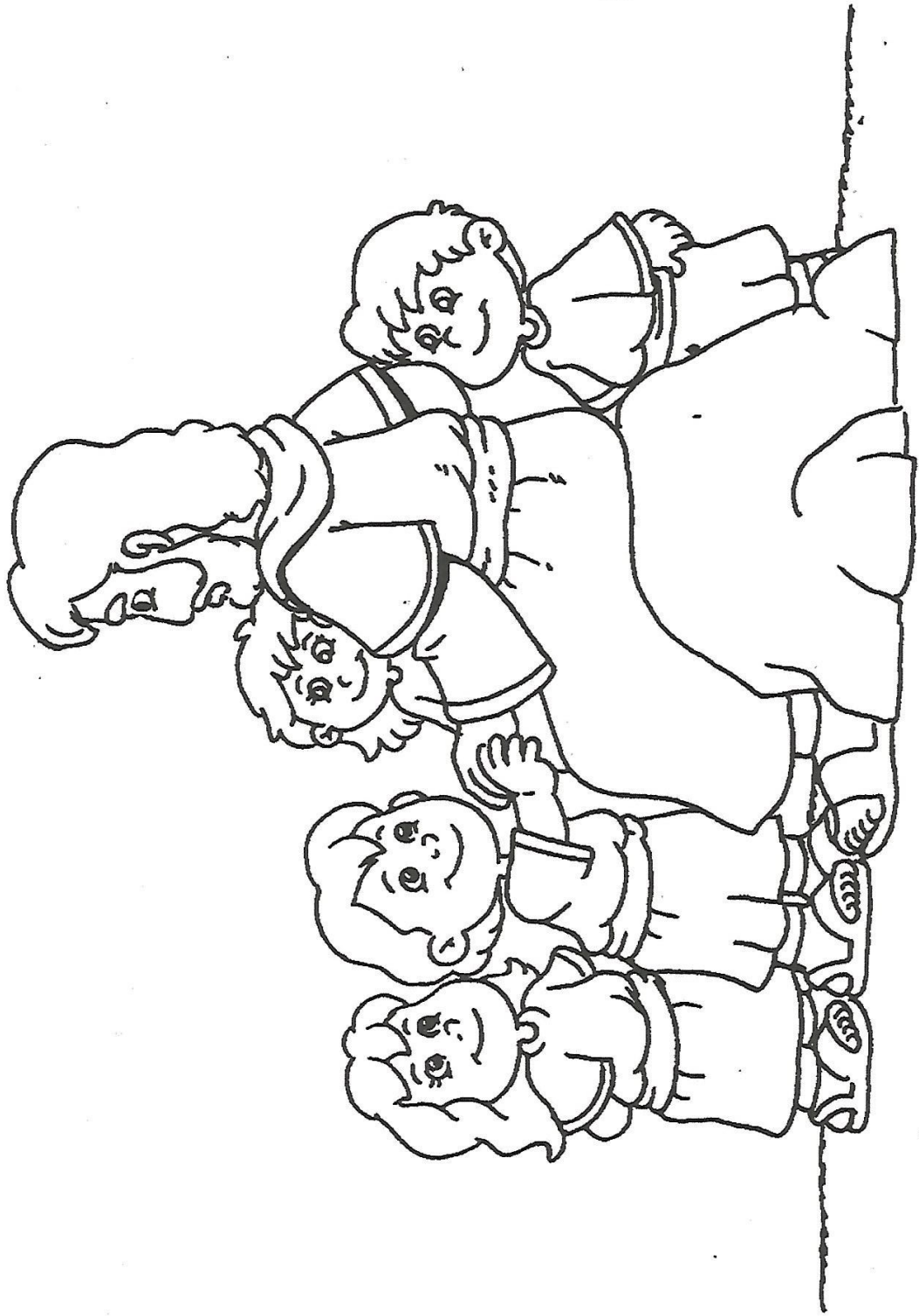
We pray that His mercy may come down on all of us and that He give researchers and doctors the wisdom and strength to find the cure in order to get through this very rough time soon, safe and healthy!
