Monday morning I found an orange plastic egg on the floor in front of one of the doors in the Lounge. My first thought was, "Oh! They missed one," knowing that our Sunday school kids had their Easter egg hunt the day before (Palm Sunday). My second thought was, "Somebody missed out on a treat." But when I picked it up, I knew immediately that it was empty either because its contents were removed and the egg discarded, or it was

Regardless, the egg was empty; and it reminded me of the metaphor countless children's message and Sunday school leaders would use to talk about the empty tomb and the gift of salvation we receive, all because of the risen Christ.

In the Gospel of John 20:1-18, Mary Magdalene's "egg," the tomb, has been opened, and the remains of her earthly gift of Christ are gone. She feels she has already lost Jesus forever despite his teachings about leaving and returning for all believers (John 14:1-7). She did not realize the tomb was *filled* with his fulfilled promises of the resurrection and life everlasting until Christ called her by name!! Christ is RISEN!!

We look to the plastic egg for the treat or gift inside that will satisfy us for a moment, and are left with wanting more because such things are temporary - earthly in nature. But the empty egg, the empty tomb is the best gift of all! Because Christ is not there, we have been given the gift of salvation and eternal life through Jesus Christ! When we pass onto that eternal life, our bodies will be empty much like that egg, or better, much like that tomb. But we will live because Christ lives!

But until that time for our new life in God's heavenly kingdom, we must sanctify God's grace in this life to help build God's kingdom here on earth and prepare for the second coming of Christ. Our righteousness comes from our faith; and then, as faithful and faith-filled people, we must put our faith into action at all times for as long as we are able. For we are Easter People! We celebrate Easter and "empty eggs" year-round. Go forth, and do great things in the name of Jesus Christ and for his sake!

This month one of our lessons had to do with Bartimaeus calling out to Jesus for mercy. Since Bartimaeus was blind our discussion included how it might feel to be blind. The children enjoyed this class.

Mark 10:46-52 New Revised Standard Version (NRSV)

"They came to Jericho. As he and his disciples and a large crowd were leaving Jericho, Bartimaeus son of Timaeus, a blind beggar, was sitting by the roadside. 47 When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout out and say, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!" <sup>48</sup> Many sternly ordered him to be quiet, but he cried out even more loudly, "Son of David, have mercy on me!" <sup>49</sup> Jesus stood still and said, "Call him here." And they called the blind man, saying to him, "Take heart; get up, he is calling you." <sup>50</sup> So throwing off his cloak, he sprang up and came to Jesus. <sup>51</sup> Then Jesus said to him, "What do you want me to do for you?" The blind man said to him, "My teacher<sup>(a)</sup> let me see again." <sup>52</sup> Jesus said to him, "Go; your faith has made you well." Immediately he regained his sight and followed him on the way.

The following week we invited church member Liane Getty to come to Sunday School to share her experiences as a blind woman, mother, daughter, sister, friend, etc. Liane brought Basil her guide dog, as well as a Braille "typewriter" called a Brailer, Braille books, a special device called Color Test to help tell her the colors of items, to name a few. She read the story of Jonah and the Whale to the children from her Braille book. The kids were fascinated that the dots could actually tell a story! The children had lots of questions and Liane was great with them. Everyone learned a lot about blindness. Thanks so much Liane!

## Finance Committee, Chuck Boyle, Chairperson February 2018

As of the end of February our church's financial status is stable. Our offerings and total income are a bit below expectations but our expenses are also below expectations. We have recorded a small loss year-todate but the loss is less than what was budgeted for this period. It is too early make a solid financial prediction for 2018 but we are always optimistic.

Outlined for you below are the significant areas of our financial reporting that are coming in differently than what was budgeted for year-to-date through February 2018.

On the revenue side our total revenues equaled \$46,500, which is \$1,300 below our budget. The major differences between our budget and actual revenue are noted below:

- General offerings came in \$5,100 below the budget. This is not a good start for the year but it is hoped that this will improve as members catch up on their offerings.
- Facility usage income is \$800 more than the budget. The use of our church by others is rather hard to predict and will fluctuate through the year.

Donations for flowers came in \$400 above the budget.

- Our Wednesday night dinners are \$500 below the budget. Lyn Wallace, the founder and leader of this outreach program had personal medical matters to deal with and, as such, there were fewer dinners. We thank Lyn for her hard work and hear that she is feeling much better.
- Investment returns from the McKay Fund are \$2,600 more than budget. This is most likely a timing issue that should correct itself over the year. The proceeds from this trust can come in at times that do not coincide with our monthly reporting.

On the expense side for the year we reported total expense of \$48,200, which is \$2,400 under our budget. The controlling of our expenses can result in a good bottom line this year. The hard work of our staff, committees, and congregation can make this possible. The major differences between our budget and actual expenses are noted below:

Altar flower expense was \$1,000 more than the budget. The vendor that we buy flowers from does not always send us timely billings and as a result this expense category can be a bit lumpy. This should correct itself over the year.

Youth transportation was \$300 less than the budget.

Youth funding from the LUMC general account is \$300 more than budget. The March payment was made in February. This will correct itself next month.

Music copyright fees are \$200 less than budgeted. This will correct itself over time.

Music supplies are \$500 more than budget. This is due to the purchase of a new sound board that is used in our sanctuary.

Choir director's compensation was \$1,400 less than the budget because this position is vacant.

Church Secretary compensation was \$900 less than the budget. This position was reduced from two part-time professionals to one with extended hours for that person. The office also is now closed on Fridays.

Sexton compensation was \$500 less than the budget. This area will fluctuate over time based on the amount of overtime worked.

Our Pastor's CPE allowance was \$500 less than the budget.

- Social security tax expense was \$200 less than the budget because of a reduction in total staff compensation expenses.
- Payroll processing fees are \$200 less than the budget. This is both a timing issue and due to having a smaller staff.
- Organ and piano maintenance are \$500 more than budget. This will correct itself over time as bills do not always match up with the budget on a monthly basis.

Utility expenses were \$100 less than the budget.

Office operation expenses were \$800 less than the budget. This will correct itself over time as bills do not always match up with the budget on a monthly basis.

This leaves us with a year-to-date net operating loss of \$1,700, which is \$1,000 better than our budget. Financial stability is challenging to accomplish and maintain. Together, in 2018, we can achieve success.

As of the end of February we have \$47,700 in the L.U.M.C. general fund. This provides the financial cushion that we need.

The Reserve Giving Fund continues to grow nicely thanks to our congregation. As of the end of February the balance in this fund is \$12,600.

Faith promise offerings year-to-date continue to be not enough to cover our missionary support expenditures. We had to take \$600 from the Faith Promise Reserve Fund to cover this shortfall. The unused cash reserve balance is currently \$4,400. At the present rate this cash reserve will be fully used within 14 months from now.

The church audit for 2017 is very close to completion. The final audit report should be completed by the beginning of May.

The 2018 budget was brought to the Administrative Board in January of this year but tabled for approval until March due to time constraints by Administrative Board. This budget was approved at the March meeting.
