Mark 4:1-20

Greetings to All!

As we wind down the winter season and enter into spring (Mar. 20!!), I recall my father prepping the garden around this time, despite the possibility of one last snow. The ground tended to be somewhat thawed, and often a bit




muddy; and there were always bits of sticks and leaves to deal with. The sticks and great clumps of leaves would be removed along with any large dead pieces of the previous year's plantings. Small amounts of leaves and plants would be left and turned into the ground as food for the new growth of vegetables.

Planning and choosing what went in the garden early was important to my father. And since it was March, he always started the planting with peas. Everything else was planted bit by bit as he could get the seeds or plants, and as the space would allow. Lettuce, scallions, tomatoes, yellow squash and zucchini, green beans, wax beans, cucumbers, radishes, cabbage,...even the occasional watermelon made it into my father's garden at one time or another.

Wherever we moved to, my father would take the time to choose the right plot of ground for his garden. He avoided wasting the seeds on compressed pathways, rocky surfaces with thin soil and areas with unmanageable weeds and thorns. He chose the best ground to receive the seeds and baby plants knowing they had a better chance of growing there with his constant maintenance and love.

In the church, it is a little different because we work with the spiritual in an earthly world. The sower does not discriminate and choose specific prepared soil, but places the seed -- spreads the Word -- wherever she or he is able. The grounds -- the people -receive it as they have presented themselves. For some, the Word goes in one ear and out the other. They may not be ready yet; or they may be unaware of the gift; or, they think they know it all and what they hear does not apply to them. For others, they receive the Word with enthusiasm, but it is short lived because of the challenges the



Word brings. And still there are others who reject the Word shortly after hearing it. They are easily distracted by earthly things and they willingly push the Word aside, often doing damage to themselves, and sometimes others, in the process.

But the sower continues to spread the Word everywhere, to all people, no matter the type or condition of the soil because of the

love of Jesus Christ, the grace of God, and the hope that grace brings. Sometimes the Word falls on soil in need of help. God's grace sees us for who and what we are. God

sees the potential for good soil in ALL of us. ALL of us. We can be made aware of God's grace and our sin and be transformed, converted through the grace of forgiveness and receive the Word, with new healthy soil that will allow that seed to grow and flourish as we accept our call to do God's work in faith and love. God's grace can then be sanctified in the work we do on behalf of Christ. We can then illuminate others so that they may open their eyes to the presence of God and God's grace, and open their hearts to the work of the Holy Spirit.

Checking your "soil," your receptivity, to the Word, is basic daily maintenance. We need to be ready to receive the Word whenever and wherever it is sown. Sometimes you may need an adjustment -- to be fed at the table or to drink living water; or there may be a time when you may need to be transformed again by the saving grace of God through Jesus Christ.

My friends, be open to the Word, and be sure to let ALL others know that God's grace is there and available for them, too. Allow them to have the opportunity to be transformed and to take in the Word so that they may truly grow in the grace of God through Jesus Christ.

From our Bishop concerning the Way Forward decision: Reflections on General Conference 2019:

Feb 27, 2019

I bid you grace and peace from the Lord Jesus Christ.

During the Monday night worship service at General Conference this week we read the following version of the Wesley Covenant Prayer:

The church is not ours but Yours, O God.

Use it however You desire, ranks it however You inspire.

Activate it, allow it to struggle.

Use it to demonstrate Your glory,

or let it be diminished so that You alone are praised,

Lift it up or bring it low,

whatever is more useful to Your mission of salvation.

Let the church be full, let it be empty.

Let it have it all, let it have nothing.

We freely and heartily yield the church to You

To enjoy what is Yours or to change what is Yours.

Open Your church to the fresh breezes of Your Spirit

Baptize Your church afresh with the rushing waters of Your Spirit

Renew, Revive, Renovate, Revitalize Your church,

Blessed God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Amen.

I lead with this as I write to you now that the 2019 Special Session of General Conference has ended. We voted to keep the traditional tenants of our current Book of Discipline that prohibit LGBTQIA+ ordination and church marriage ceremonies. The "Traditional Plan" in its entirety did not passed because it has a number of unconstitutional petitions. The Judicial Council at their April meeting will further refine this. The "One Church Plan" (the more progressive option) did not pass and the margin of the vote was close.

I am deeply aware of the hurt and pain that this has brought upon the LGBTQAI+ community, their families and friends. I regret this pain and suffering and call us to minister grace and healing to this part of our church family. Everyone is of sacred worth and all are indispensable for the upbuilding of the church.

The mission and ministry of Jesus Christ is still our mission and vision. Nothing can separate us from that love of God. Let us continue this work in the strength of the Spirit.

Sunday School - by Lyn Wallace

As I am sure most of you are aware that I have become the new Sunday School teacher.

Our Sunday school presently includes ages 3 - , and attendance varies from 1 to 12 depending on the week. We have been working through the Cokesbury curriculum designed for one-room Sunday School classes. I find that it is difficult to adapt this program for the younger members of the class and so we will be splitting the lesson for kids aged 3 - 5, and 6 and over, using the pre-school curriculum for them beginning this month.

Each week we address a Bible story or famous person from the Bible The class receives a reading and an activity sheet, as well as a take-home sheet. It would be very helpful if parents would take a few minutes to read this sheet and talk to your child about it.

We have given each child a Lenten garland. This is the child's first real experience with Lent, and its significance in our faith. The garland begins with the 46th day which is Ash Wednesday and runs through the end of the Lenten season before Easter Sunday. In order to teach the children the idea of preparing for the Resurrection though prayer, fasting, and sacrificing. Please help your child read the activity for the day and help hem / her do this, if possible. Put a check mark on the day to show that this has been read to keep track of the Lenten Season. [Ash Wednesday is 46 days before Easter, and 40 days are symbolic of Jesus' time in the wilderness before he began his ministry.]


Class size: We now have 11 children coming.


- 3-4 year olds: 6 children

Stewardship Updates

Word to Live By for March: GRACE

Grace can be defined as the love and mercy given to us by God because God wants us to have it, not because of anything we have done to earn it. We read in the Letter to the Ephesians: "For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God — not the result of works, so that no one may boast" (Ephesians 2:8-9).

John Wesley, the founder of the Methodist movement, described God's grace as threefold:

prevenient grace

justifying grace

sanctifying grace

Prevenient Grace

Wesley understood grace as God's active presence in our lives. This presence is not dependent on human actions or human response. It is a gift — a gift that is always available, but that can be refused.

God's grace stirs up within us a desire to know God and empowers us to respond to God's invitation to be in relationship with God. God's grace enables us to discern differences between good and evil and makes it possible for us to choose good....

God takes the initiative in relating to humanity. We do not have to beg and plead for God's love and grace. God actively seeks us!¹

Justifying Grace

Paul wrote to the church in Corinth: "In Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them" (2 Corinthians 5:19). And in his letter to the Roman Christians, Paul wrote: "But God proves his love for us in that while we still were sinners Christ died for us" (Romans 5:8).

These verses demonstrate the justifying grace of God. They point to reconciliation, pardon, and restoration. Through the work of God in Christ our sins are forgiven, and our relationship with God is restored. According to John Wesley, founder of the Methodist movement, the image of God — which has been distorted by sin — is renewed within us through Christ's death.

Again, this dimension of God's grace is a gift. God's grace alone brings us into relationship with God. There are no hoops through which we have to jump in order to please God and to be loved by God. God has acted in Jesus Christ. We need only to respond in faith.¹ Conversion

This process of salvation involves a change in us that we call conversion. Conversion is a turning around, leaving one orientation for another. It may be sudden and dramatic, or gradual and cumulative. But in any case, it's a new beginning. Following Jesus' words to Nicodemus, "You must be born anew" (John 3:7 RSV), we speak of this conversion as rebirth, new life in Christ, or regeneration.

Following Paul and Luther, John Wesley called this process justification. Justification is what happens when Christians abandon all those vain attempts to justify themselves before God, to be seen as "just" in God's eyes through religious and moral practices. It's a time when God's "justifying grace" is experienced and accepted, a time of pardon and forgiveness, of new peace and joy and love. Indeed, we're justified by God's grace through faith.

Justification is also a time of repentance — turning away from behaviors rooted in sin and toward actions that express God's love. In this conversion we can expect to receive assurance of our present salvation through the Holy Spirit "bearing witness with our spirit that we are children of God" (Romans 8:16).²

Sanctifying Grace

Salvation is not a static, one-time event in our lives. It is the ongoing experience of God's gracious presence transforming us into whom God intends us to be. John Wesley described this dimension of God's grace as sanctification, or holiness.¹

Through God's sanctifying grace, we grow and mature in our ability to live as Jesus lived. As we pray, study the Scriptures, fast, worship, and share in fellowship with other Christians, we deepen our knowledge of and love for God. As we respond with compassion to human need and work for justice in our communities, we strengthen our capacity to love neighbor. Our inner thoughts and motives, as well as our outer actions and behavior, are aligned with God's will and testify to our union with God. ¹

Scott Hamilton delivers his 'most difficult talk'

NASHVILE, Tenn.—

This is the most difficult talk I've ever given."

That is how Scott Hamilton, an Olympic champion skater who has delivered hundreds of speeches, began his September keynote address to Nashville leaders

committed to ending violence against women and girls.

"We are here to talk about something we don't want to talk about," Scott told 500 attendees at the third annual AMEND (a combination of "men" and end") breakfast, sponsored by the YWCA of Middle Tennes-

Gil Hanke holds the Community Leader Award as he joins Scott Hamilton, three-time world figure skating champion and the recipient of the gold medal at the 1984 Winter Olympics.

Scott spoke about women in his life who experienced abuse and said "I have so many regrets" as he thought about what he might have done and what he did not do to counter a boys-will-be-boys culture that treats women as sexual objects.

Scott, the survivor of testicular cancer and three brain tumor diagnoses, derives much of his fighting spirit from Scripture. He suggests Paul's letter to the Church at Galatia provides wise counsel for those who seek ways to end domestic violence. Paul cites the fruits of the spirit as "love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control" (Galatians 5: 22-23). He underscored the importance of self-control.

"Violence against women ends here," concluded Scott as he called for support of the AMEND effort to make Nashville the safest city in the nation for women and girls.

The AMEND program

Noting that one of every four women will be a victim of domestic violence and

one in five will be raped, the YWCA provides housing for victims of domestic abuse. The city currently houses 60 victims of domestic violence in undisclosed shelters across the city.

As the demand for housing increased,
in 2014, the
YWCA created
the AMEND program to address
the root causes of
violence against
women.

The General Commission on UM Men joined the effort by creating Amending through Faith, an 8-week study that helps men and boys challenge a culture that supports violence against women.

Hanke receives award

During the breakfast meeting at the Omni Hotel, the YWCA presented awards to four community leaders.

The Community Leader of the Year Award was presented to Gil Hanke. The top staff executive of the General Commission on UM Men was cited for his work to create the 8-week AMEND study and as a leader of the only faith community involved in the effort.

This year we challenge those who have never given to Faith Promise Missions to trust God, take a step of faith, and start giving. Faith Promise Giving is not about increasing offerings or reaching missions' goals. It does accomplish those things, but it is actually about Obedience to Christ.

Faith promise giving encourages us to give beyond what we think we can give in order to increase world missions. Faith promise gifts differ from regular offerings in that a faith promise requires the giver to commit to giving what he or she does not currently have—a promise requiring faith that God will provide.

The faith promise approach to giving is often credited to A.B. Simpson, a 19th-century Canadian preacher and the founder of the Christian and Missionary Alliance. Simpson based the model on 2 Corinthians 10:15–16:

"Neither do we go beyond our limits by boasting of work done by others. Our hope is that, as your faith continues to grow, our sphere of activity among you will greatly expand, so that we can preach the gospel in the regions beyond you. For we do not want to boast about work already done in someone else's territory."

Here are several components of Faith Promise Giving to keep in mind:

- Church members are to prayerfully consider the amount to promise.
- The giving is to be in addition to a person's normal offering (or tithe).
- The promise is a faith commitment, often a one-year promise. For example, a church member will commit to give a certain amount weekly to the church's missions program. Oftentimes, the church will support missionaries based on the commitments they receive from the church members.
- Faith is to be placed in God, not the giver's own power. The church members are encouraged to commit to give as much money as possible while trusting God to meet their needs. The whole process is to be carried out in faith, trusting God to supply.
