

COVID-19 Update from the Eastern PA Conference of the United Methodist Church

April 30, 2020

Greetings All.

Know that I have been praying for us all as we paddle through these unknown waters separately, but together. We will need to continue our stay-at-home, quarantine, lock-down status until we hear from Pennsylvania's Department of Health, the Center for Disease Control (CDC), and Governor Wolf. This may take a while, and when we do change our status for the better, it will need to come in phases. At this time, there are three phases:

- RED, which we are in NOW;
- YELLOW;
- and GREEN.

The conference reports that "we do not yet have a timeline or date to move to the YELLOW PHASE."

On April 29, 2020, our Bishop and Cabinet released "guidelines of best practices as we move through the coming weeks and months ahead." If you would like to view this list, please click on the link below* to the conference website and the post which I am referencing to create this update. There is an additional link that will take you to the guidelines at the bottom of the website post. The conference reports that "these guidelines may be updated or changed as we learn new information from the PA Department of Health/CDC."

I have been asked to share this document with our church leadership and have done so with a core group from the Administrative Board. As a core, we will read the document for total understanding and then meet with the entire Administrative Board in the near future to discuss the documents, and how we will comply with the guidelines with the safety and comfort of all in mind. The Conference tells us that they are creating a Q&A document related to the guidelines for best practices for us. It will be released in the near future.

This local church and the EPA Conference speak in concert as the Conference states:

"Most important, the health and welfare of our members and communities remain our first priority. Please especially watch the CDC and Department of Health for information that relates specifically to vulnerable populations. We will continue to monitor the directives for these groups."

My love and prayers are with you all. Let me know if you need some extra love, prayers, or just an ear to listen. I am here as are many of your church family members. You are not alone even though, for some of you, it may feel like you are. Take care. Stay home, stay healthy, and stay faithful.



Calkins Memorial Scholarship Award Application - 2020

Background - This memorial scholarship was established in 1978 after the tragic loss of Ellen Adele Calkins. While a senior enrolled at the University of Delaware, she was killed in an automobile accident at the young age of 21. This scholarship fund was later increased after the deaths of Jacqueline Calkins in 1987 and Frederic Calkins in 2015 to honor their memory, as well.

- Candidate must be a sophomore, junior or senior in good academic standing at an accredited, recognized two-year or four-year institution.
- Candidate must be a member of Langhorne United Methodist Church by confirmation, transfer, or profession of faith.
- Candidate must complete this entire application legibly, then sign and date it. If the applicant is under 18 years of age, the application must be co-signed by the applicant's legal parent/guardian.

Things have been relatively quiet around the church, other than the complaints from our neighbors about our trees. The large Silver Maple in the front of the church is in bad shape. It has been dropping branches onto our neighbor's yard and he is concerned for his young children. And, a woman who lives behind the church is also dealing with dead and falling branches.

I asked Big Oak Tree Service to take a look. He says that the Silver Maple is dead in the upper parts and really needs to be cut back. He did remove a lot of the branches that have been falling onto the neighbor's yard, at the expense of the neighbor because the tree is on the property line. Doing the work that is needed however is on us – starting and the top and bringing it down about half way to save the tree. This will be \$3,500. He is now checking the trees behind the church to give me a price – they are the dead Ash trees and they need to be removed.

Both of these issues need to be addressed – and we don't have the money readily available. I read a comment on Facebook that a woman posed that says "My car mileage has increased greatly, I am now getting three weeks per gallon." So, perhaps you could use some of your gas budget to the tree fund; after all, your gas mileage has probably tripled in the past few weeks

The refrigerator has been ordered and will be installed when some of the restrictions have been removed.

So what have you been doing with your time? Do you find yourselves wandering around looking for something to do? Don't worry, the fur babies are still supplying plenty of dog hair to be swept. However, I find that with the infinite amount of time located in this very finite house, I have been doing a lot of self-examination. For example, I have found closets that benefited from a healthy clean out – but they got me thinking, As I stood in front of the first closet I found myself asking "Why do you have SO Many clothes." I have worn nothing other than stretch pants and sweat shirts for the past three weeks. I made a pledge to get rid of half the stuff. Really, how many navy blue shirts can you wear? So, I stuck to my plan, half is going to a donation center and I am going to keep my closets organized. I have gone through every thing I own, divided into piles of keep and donate and am proud that I have not second-guessed any of my decisions. It took me three days! Bottom line, I have filled quite a few bags to take to a donation center, Bad news, the donation centers are all closed so my bags will be adding to the the junk on the deck. But, it's ok, the project took me several days so I was able to occupy myself for quite a few hours!

Seal my lips on my aches and pains. They're increasing, and love of rehearsing them is becoming sweeter as the time goes by.


I dare not ask for grace enough to enjoy the tales of others' pains, but please help me to endure them with patience.


Give me the ability to see good things in unexpected places and talents in unexpected people. And give me, O Lord, the grace to tell them so.





- Rachel, Jacob's most beloved wife, is the first of several women recorded in the Bible as dying in childbirth (Genesis 35:16 - 19).
- Deborah was the only woman Judge over ancient Israel (Judges 4:4). She performed this important responsibility for forty years, from 1192 to 1152 B.C. She is also the only known Israelite woman who chose the military leader of the army (Judges 4:6).
- Athaliah was the only woman to reign and rule over any Israelites. She was the sole monarch of the Kingdom of Judah from 841 to 835 B.C. Her and Jezebel are the only two women known to have exercised the authority to command a mass murder be committed to suit their own evil goals (1Kings 18:4, 2Kings 11:1 - 2, 2Chronicles 22:10 - 11).

The Story of the Poppy



The Heinz Ketchup Twitter account (the official account!) chimed in. They posted only one word in response to my much-maligned post:


“Eggcellent.”
